**Re: Countywide Recycling and Disposal Facility (CRDF), Stark County
Ohio Administrative Code (OAC) Rule 3745-27-10(D)(7)(c)(ii) Approval**

Dear Mr. Vandersall:

On February 8, 2006, the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (Ohio EPA), Division of Solid and Infectious Waste Management (DSIWM), Northeast District Office (NEDO) received a document titled "2005 Second Semiannual Ground-Water Results and Statistical Analyses," dated February 6, 2006, for Countywide Recycling and Disposal Facility (Facility) located in Stark County. This document was submitted by Eagon & Associates, Inc, and contains the ground water sampling results and the statistical analysis from the November 28 through December 1, 2005 and January 16 through January 17, 2006 ground water sampling events at the Facility.

According to the document, analysis of the ground water detection monitoring data indicated that the following statistically significant changes were detected: potassium in monitoring well MW-41; ammonia in monitoring well MW-103; and arsenic in monitoring well MW-120A.

Pursuant to OAC Rule 3745-27-10(D)(7)(c)(ii), the owner or operator may demonstrate that a source other than the sanitary landfill facility caused the contamination, or that the statistically significant change resulted from error in sampling, analysis, or statistical evaluation or natural variation in ground water quality. A report documenting this demonstration must be submitted to and approved by Ohio EPA. If the owner or operator does not obtain approval to continue detection monitoring within two hundred ten (210) days from initial sampling, the owner or operator is required to comply with the provisions of OAC Rule 3745-27-10(E) for ground water quality assessment monitoring.

The February 6, 2006 document concluded that the statistically significant changes for potassium in monitoring well MW-41, ammonia in monitoring well MW-103, and arsenic in monitoring well MW-120A were due to natural variation in ground water quality, and not as a result of impact from the landfill.

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Ohio EPA has reviewed the applicable information and concurs with the demonstration included in the February 2, 2006 document. Therefore, pursuant to OAC Rule 3745-27-10(D)(7)(c)(ii), the owner or operator is hereby authorized to continue the detection monitoring program at the Facility for monitoring wells MW-41, MW-103 and MW-120A.

Should future or existing ground water sampling results indicate statistically significant changes in ground water monitoring parameters, the owner or operator will be required to either enter into assessment monitoring in accordance with OAC Rule 3745-27-10(E) or obtain approval to remain in the detection monitoring program.

You are hereby notified that this action of the Director of Ohio EPA (Director) is final and may be appealed to the Environmental Review Appeals Commission (Commission) pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 3745.04. The appeal must be in writing and set forth the action complained of and the grounds upon which the appeal is based. It must be filed with the Commission within thirty (30) days after notice of the Director's action. A copy of the appeal must be served on the Director within three (3) days after filing with the Commission. An appeal may be filed with the Commission at the following address:
